My Open Studio experience Victoria Braithwaite

After I moved to a new house and county, I was happy to find that Ayrshire holds an artist-run Open Studio event. I've visited a few around the country and thought about participating, but there was nothing in South Lanarkshire where I previously lived.

I had a 'gap' in my painting schedule early in the year, as



a couple of annual events I usually submit works to are not running this year, and I had no commission deadlines early on, only a couple of pieces due in the Autumn. This year was to be mainly a 'planting and planning' year - so I signed up and tried to get organised.

This mainly involved flailing about in a very chaotic fashion, including raiding galleries' plan chests for semiforgotten originals to frame up, frantically mounting prints, scrubbing the bathroom and decorating bits of the house that would be receiving visitors. I raided the garden centre to add some instant colour to my winter-ravaged pots, and vaguely tidied the rest of the garden. I gathered together prints and cards, filled the house with flowers, got some one-off goodies put together (tea-towels and key rings), framed up some old

and painted some new bits and bobs.

The trickiest part of the whole enterprise - and I will approach it very differently next time, was promotion.

House, Aberlady, from 19th January till 28th February 2019. Yes, you read that right, it is very soon indeed, so please start thinking about your entries for this now. Waterston House has a beautiful gallery with amazing views of the Forth looking right down the estuary to the sea. We expect to be able to hang about 40 to 42 pictures and this affords an excellent opportunity for members to exhibit again previously exhibited pictures. Perhaps if you have pictures depicting seed pods, berries or autumn fruits which birds would use for food, you might like to consider exhibiting these particularly. Similarly, if you are looking for an autumn project, possibly for a class, this may prove a source of inspiration for you; and you may even wish to consider adding birds or pollinators to your work. Please note that delivery day for this exhibition will be Thursday 17th January, so there is a clear deadline for you to work towards.

We expect to send out the application forms by the middle of October. Please note that you will have a shorter time than normal to decide on entry, as these will require to be returned by mid-November, so please start thinking about this now. We also need 6 images for advertising and web purposes and we will be contacting members in October about this.

There will also be an opportunity to sell some cards at this show. However, these will be strictly limited in number, and the final decision as to which ones will actually be chosen, will be made by their Exhibitions Co-ordinator. There will be no opportunity to sell prints at this exhibition. We look forward to receiving your applications in due course.

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There was an awful lot of dropping off leaflets and brochures, and finding relevant places where interested folk would see them. Keeping up with the organisation's facebook and emails was also necessary.

It was an absolute head-scratcher trying to remember everyone who should be invited - Despite many lists, I forgot to include everyone who has attended my classes, neighbours and relatives - a major downside of not



keeping mailing lists and shunning administration. Apologies if you are one of those people I missed out!

I would say that it was at least two weeks of full-time work (spread over a couple of months) getting set up, and a fairly major initial outlay.

However, once the doors opened and people made the journey to my particular

middle of nowhere, it was well worth it. Many more made the trip than I expected, and even though there were quiet periods on the Friday and the Monday, the weekend kept me busy. My other half Jared helped hugely during the busy periods, making sure noone was ignored, even when four carloads arrived at once, and checking that everyone had tea and a catalogue.

I met some fascinating people, got to know some of my neighbours better and signed up a couple for classes and one-on-one tuition. Several kind visitors brought plants or flowers from their own homes to share with

me.

If any of our members are considering participating in an event like this, I would highly recommend it, even though at the busiest times I swore never to go through it again.

A couple of places still available for this – see stop press to book. For those attending please review the details in the Spring 2018 newsletter regarding materials required. BUT as you may not have this here is the basics. Herewith below course requirements and suggestions from Margaret:

Everyone to bring their own pencils / mechanical

pencils (preferably HB, B or 2B) and a sharpener if applicable, erasers, palettes and a plastic bag to store these in if taking a break (acrylics dry VERY quickly), and at least two pots each for water.

Also a good idea to bring a sketchbook or practice paper of some kind to work out composition or tricky bits - and to keep under the hand to prevent smudging. If anyone is prone to splashing paint about, then an old shirt or apron is a good idea acrylics will NOT wash out!

Botanic Cottage Lecture – 15th March 2018 by Hazel Morris

On a windy and very wet day in mid-March, a small group of hardy souls battled their way through the Gardens to the Botanic Cottage for two fascinating talks by Jane Corrie and Gerry Gallagher on the saving and reconstruction of this important little building. In 1763 the Botanic Garden moved from where the Waverley Station now stands, to a new larger site on the west side of Leith Walk, which was then on the edge of Edinburgh. Dr.John Hope, the Regius Keeper, commissioned two of the most renowned architects of the Georgian era, John Adam and James Craig to design a house for his gardener. From 1766, the upstairs room in the Gardener's Cottage, known as the Professor's Room was used for botany lectures for students attending Edinburgh University's famous medical school. When the RBGE moved from there to its current home in


Inverleith, the Gardener's Cottage situated in what was by then, a small side lane off McDonald Road, behind Leith



walk, was variously used as a private house and offices before being

abandoned. By 2007, the house was in such a state of disrepair that it was in danger of being demolished. **Jane Corrie** explained how a small group of civic minded campaigners who included architectural historians, botanists and experts on Edinburgh, hatched a plan to save this small and almost forgotten part of Scotland's Enlightenment, by applying for a Lottery Grant for the dismantling and storage of the cottage, while the RBGE undertook the fundraising of the 2.5 million pounds required for its the re-building and refurbishment.

Gerry Gallagher then took over the story explaining about the raising of the funds as well as the fascinating story of the architectural detective work that went into the re-building of the structure and its adjacent outbuildings exactly as it was.

Flora Scotia



Firstly, Peter Mitchell reporting in the Institute for Analytical Plant Illustration (No 66) newsletter (June 2018)

A visit to friends near Edinburgh in early May enabled me to see the Scottish contribution to the Worldwide Day of Botanical Art. The exhibition started on 31st March, well in advance of the day itself

on 18th May, at the Royal Botanic Garden, Edinburgh. There were 55 works shown, by 34 artists including two members of IAPI, Sarah Howard and Sarah Roberts.

As you would expect, all the illustrations were superb but interestingly varied in subject and style. Native "flora" had been interpreted widely to include one illustration of a seaweed, one moss, three ferns, two fungi and three of lichens. Fran Thomas's illustration of shaggy inkcap (Coprinus comatus) used ink made from the fungus itself! Two of the lichen works portrayed several species, one of lichens found on twigs, the other on a rock, the rock itself painted in most convincing fashion (Claire Dalby). Some of the work was what I would call arty-taking delight in the sheer beauty of the subject—such as fern croziers, sweet chestnut fruits and seeds, a spray of rowan berries and leaves, butterwort plants in flower. Many others were more botanical: with leaves shown front and back, flowers and fruits, enlargements, dissections, habit drawings, and bark illustrated for several species of tree. There were three lovely watercolours each with three species from the same habitat shown intermingled (Morna Henderson).

Sarah Roberts had taken a theme of nitrogen- fixing plants and illustrated bitter vetch (*Lathyrus linifolius*), bog myrtle (*Myrica gale*) and sea buckthorn (*Hippophae*

These watercolours included flowers and fruit, enlargements and dissections, and illustrations of the root and nodules in which the symbiotic organisms take nitrogen from the air and fix it into compounds usable by the plant. This is an example of the analytical approach used to show a feature of ecological significance, relating structure to function. Michael Hickey would approve, I'm sure.

The Worldwide Day of Botanical Art was an opportunity for each country to show its native flora. (Sweet chestnut in this case must be seen as an honorary native: introduced by the Romans and making itself thoroughly at home and able to spread by seed.) Not surprisingly, there are overlaps in the species covered by Flora Scotia and the Association of British Botanical Artists (ABBA) exhibition In Ruskin's Footsteps.

Blackthorn (*Prunus spinosa*) Bluebell (*Hyacinthoides nonscripta*) Foxglove (*Digitalis purpurea*) Hawthorn (*Crataegus monogyna*) Lesser celandine (*Ficaria verna*) Ribwort (*Plantago lanceolata*) Thrift (*Armeria maritima*) Yellow flag (*Iris pseudacorus*)

It is fascinating to compare the illustrations from the two catalogues to see how different artists have tackled the same plant. Christine Battle and Sarah Howard, for instance, have each featured in watercolour the berries of blackthorn and captured the bloom beautifully. Christine also has a flowering shoot in graphite. Sarah shows a flower in outline separately but what caught my attention was the exquisite depiction of the leaves, at this late season, with the tears and holes and beginnings of change of colour. Claire Dalby (Flora Scotia) produced a conventional botanical illustration of bluebell, including bulb and roots, with superb cross sections of flower and fruit. Billy Showell, on the other hand, concentrated on the above-ground plant, with beautifully executed foliage, plus some fun with graphite bluebells in the background and a trompe l'oeil effect of some page edges to bring to mind a sketchbook. For thrift, Gaynor Dickeson (In Ruskin's Footsteps) and Fran Thomas have produced fairly similar illustrations. Gaynor, however, was especially concerned to show the structure of the inflorescence whereas Fran provided more details of an individual flower and a fruit.

I visited the Flora Scotia exhibition that ran from 31 March to 3 June 2018 at the Royal Botanic Garden in Edinburgh (RGBE). I went there in May and Spring had not yet sprung there so the gardens were not in full bloom which was a shame. However, there was still plenty to see and I had gone there for the Flora Scotia.
